

Kure Beach has been approached by Special Olympics New Hanover County to host the Polar Plunge and 5K event on Saturday, February 11, 2017. They are requesting use of the Ocean Front Park, K Avenue east of Fort Fisher Boulevard, Atlantic Avenue, and portions of the Boardwalk and Beach for the event.

Event details, outlined in the following pages, mirror the exact event they held in Kure Beach in 2015. In addition, all aspects of the event will be reviewed by each Kure Beach Department for their input and approval.

Before event planning can progress further, Council action is required on the following items:

- Close K Avenue east of Fort Fisher Boulevard and Atlantic Avenue between K and L Avenue to vehicle traffic from the early morning hours through 5 p.m. on Saturday, February 11, 2017.
- Allow for a 5K race to be held on Kure Beach streets in conjunction with the event.
- Allow 3-5 food trucks vendors to be parked within the closed portion of Atlantic Avenue with other event vendors.
- Waive the Special Event fees associated with this event due to the Non-Profit status of Special Olympics New Hanover County.

Special Olympics New Hanover County Polar Plunge and 5K Run

Components of Event:

Vendors A variety of 10-15 vendors participate in the event. The types of

vendors vary, but usually include Special Olympics NHC, Island Women, Knights of Columbus, and other non-profit groups and businesses. They are allowed to hand out information and sell their goods/services during the event. Depending upon the number participating, they will be lined along Atlantic Avenue, under the Pavilion, and possibly a few in the lawn area of Ocean Front Park.

Special Olympics NHC would like 3-5 food trucks to be included with the other vendors for this event. The trucks would park along Atlantic Avenue and sell product throughout the event. Each participating truck would be required to display proper Health Department permits.

Music Exact bands and/or DJ have not yet been determined, but music

will play on the Ocean Front Park stage during the 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. timeframe and a band will play at the Ocean Front Park beach

access for the plunge.


Car Show Sun Coast Cruisers (family oriented car club out of Wilmington)

usually comes out for the event. They typically have 10-15 cars on

site. If they are going to participate in 2015, possible placement would be the along the closed portion of K Avenue.

Race

The race is a 5K, which is 3.2 miles, and will begin at 1:30 p.m. The race will be implemented by a professional event management company that specializes in races. They hope to use the same route as in 2015, which is outlined as such: head north on Atlantic Avenue, cross Fort Fisher Boulevard at N Avenue, weave through the neighborhoods west of Fort Fisher Boulevard, cross back over Fort Fisher Boulevard at N Avenue, and head south on Atlantic Avenue towards Ocean Front Park.



The only portion of the race route that would be completely closed to vehicle traffic is Atlantic Avenue between K and L Avenue. Volunteers would be stationed at each intersection along the race route to direct runners. Police assistance would be needed to direct traffic at the Fort Fisher Boulevard crossing.

Plunge

The plunge will take place from the beach area north of the Pier. Sections will be blocked off for those plunging, with spectators lined along the perimeter and on the Pier. In the past, the event has drawn crowds of between 1,000-1,500 people, including participants. A portable PA system may need to be used on the beach for the announcement and countdown to plunge.

Provisional Needs:

Insurance Special Olympics NHC has been made aware of the need to

provide the Town proof of general liability insurance, listing the Town as additionally insured, with limits no less than 1 (one)

million dollars.

Restrooms Public restrooms will need to be opened, as well as the restrooms

under the Pavilion. This will provide 8 total toilet stalls. In the past, Special Olympics NHC has only provided 6 portable toilets. The event draws a large crowd, but many are only on site for a

short period of time during the Plunge.

Trash The Town's onsite trash receptacles will be used, along with

additional cans located in storage at Ocean Front Park. The additional cans will be setup in the food area, as that will be the

biggest producer of trash at the event.

Parking All public parking throughout Town will be available for use.

Being off season with many local businesses closed, competition

for those public parking spaces will be decreased.

Electricity Sufficient electrical outlets are available in the Pavilion. Should the

food trucks be approved and need electricity, there are now outlets

available along Atlantic Avenue as well.

Medical New Hanover County Sherriff's Department is on site during the

event. They also provide in-water assistance during the plunge. Kure Beach Fire Department may be asked to assist during event.

Potential Special Event Fees to Be Waived:

Below are the applicable special events fees that Special Olympics New Hanover County is asking be waived. The grand total is dependent upon the number of personnel needed and overall length of time, which is still being determined.

The Kure Beach Town Council held their regular meeting on Tuesday, August 16, 2016 at 6:30 p.m. The Town Attorney was present and there was a quorum of Council members.

Mayor Swearingen presented Ret. Chief Cooper with an appreciation plaque from the town and proceeded to read a letter written on behalf of the town by Officer Joe Miljenovic which extolled Ret. P&Z Chairman, John Ellen, said the commission reviewed the proposed beach safety and conservation standards ordinance at their August meeting, given to them by council, and he presented the changes they recommend.

Town Attorney Canoutas recommended that, although the proposed new ordinance is in Chapter 12 and isn't a zoning ordinance under Chapter 19, council should schedule a Public Hearing for public input since the proposed ordinance could have future legal implications for the town.

MOTION – Commissioner Heglar moved to hold a Public Hearing at Town Hall on Tuesday, September 20th at 6:00 p.m., or soon thereafter, for the purpose of receiving public input on the proposed new ordinance under Chapter 12 Parks and Recreation, Article 2 Recreation, Division 2 Beach, Subdivision A Beach Safety and Conservation Standards, as follows: Sections 12-47 Policy, 12-48 Safety and Conservation Standards and 12-49 Exceptions.

Chairman Ellen said there will be a Beach Inlet Management Plan (BIMP) meeting on September 8th from 6:00-8:00 p.m. at the NHC Government Center to receive public input. Commissioner Whitley said that he planned to attend the meeting.

DISCUSSION AND CONSIDERATION OF DEPARTMENT HEAD BUSINESS

1. Finance Department

a. Adopt Capital Project Ordinance and Approve Budget Amendment 17-01 to transfer \$50,000 from the General Fund to the Capital Project Fund for the proposed Town Hall Expansion and New Fire Station

Finance Officer Copenhaver said council directed him to transfer \$28,500 to a Capital Project Fund for architectural fees for the proposed Town Hall expansion and new Fire Station during their July council meeting. He said he rounded up that amount to \$50,000 to cover related expenses so that he doesn't have to come back to council for approval every time a related expense comes up, giving the example of a \$3,000+ topographical survey expense.

MOTION – Commissioner Heglar moved to adopt the Capital Project Ordinance and to approve Budget Amendment 17-01, to transfer \$50,000 from the General Fund to the Capital Project Fund; both for the proposed Town Hall Expansion and New Fire Station. SECOND – Commissioner Whitley

VOTE – Unanimous

Said budget amendment and ordinance are herein incorporated as part of these minutes.

2. Public Works Department

a. Cost to Install and Light Decorative and Solar Lights on Atlantic Avenue Mayor Swearingen said Director Beeker was able to meet with Ms. Pollard from Duke Energy and she sees no problem replacing the lights. She said Director Beeker will give council the information as soon as he gets it. She read an article from the American Medical Association (AMA) regarding health problems that LED lights can potentially cause. She said she'd like to schedule a meeting for Duke Energy and the NC Wildlife Resources Commission to address council and the public on this subject.

MOTION – Mayor Swearingen moved to hold a Special Meeting at Town Hall on Tuesday, September 20th at 5:00 p.m., or soon thereafter, for Duke Energy and the NC Wildlife Resources Commission to provide information to council and the public on LED street lights.

SECOND – Commissioner Heglar

VOTE – Unanimous

Commissioner Heglar said the meeting should be limited to one hour in length.

b. Lift Station Funding

Mayor Swearingen said she attended a training session with the NC Department of Environmental Quality (NC DEQ) regarding their application process for funding. She said the town wouldn't qualify for their grant but could qualify to have 100 percent of the project cost financed in a 20-year state loan through the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF). She gave a cost scenario of getting the state's loan versus a bank loan and noted that the state loan could save them town around \$60,000. She added the following information regarding the state loan:

- The six-page application needs to be completed and submitted by September 30th.
- Per Brian Cox, Engineering Services would need to do an Environmental Assessment in order to complete the state's complicated set of forms, for which they would charge the town an additional \$15,000.
- The town would need to do an Asset Assessment Review to be considered for the loan.
- The town wouldn't know until January 31st if it received the loan.
- The project would need to be completed within two years and any engineering costs incurred before September 30th wouldn't be included in the loan.
- The mayor spoke with a representative from the CWSRF during the session, and he said he would be willing to work with the town to do as many things the state would allow between September 30th and January 31st, and the town may be able to have the permitting process be fast-tracked.
- She and Mr. Cox would like to meet with the CWSRF representative again to review what he told her and see if he thinks the town has a real chance to get the loan.

Mayor Swearingen reviewed the pump station site comparison that was completed by Engineering Services stating that Director Beeker would like to put the lift station next to the one already there.

Commissioner Heglar said the town has \$1.9 million dollars in cash for utility infrastructure, so that we could pay for the entire project without taking out a loan. He said he doesn't want to pay interest to anyone if the town doesn't have to. He said the process of applying for the loan will take up a lot of staff time, and the environmental study will eat up a lot of the purported savings.

Finance Officer Copenhaver said he doesn't recommend the town pay all cash for the project since the town is already paying for the Bypass Force Main project and a couple of other things. He said that, for the past few years, the town has basically been bringing in what it needs for operating expenses versus bringing in reserves, so he will need to weigh everything out before making a recommendation to council.

Commissioner Heglar said the town could pay for some of the cost of the project up front and then get a shorter loan term.

Finance Officer Copenhaver said that a shorter term would definitely carry a lower interest rate.

Mayor Swearingen said that Mr. Cox hasn't given real figures on what he thinks the extra costs for the project would be.

MPT Bloszinsky said council needs solid numbers and more financing options on which to base a decision. He said he agrees with Director Beeker's opinion to not use the land on H Avenue across from Public Works, because the town could lose the potential value of that land and its tax value if used for the lift station. He said he also agrees with Commissioner Heglar on not borrowing money if the town doesn't have to.

Mayor Swearingen said she agrees with the finance officer's recommendation to not pay cash for the entire project.

Commissioner Heglar said he will probably do whatever the finance officer recommends, but Kure Beach has historically paid for large Public Works projects without taking out huge loans; the town would save enough money ahead of time to pay for the projects in cash. He said, if the town takes out a large, long-term loan to build a utility infrastructure system and it gets wiped away in a storm, the town will continue paying on a loan for a system that is no longer viable.

c. Asset Management Program

Mayor Swearingen said another grant from the NCDEQ is for an Asset Management Program. She told council that she would like them to decide between now and next spring if it would be of any benefit to the town. She said Carolina Beach received a grant to do this and it helped them with their Capital Investment Plan.

DISCUSSION AND CONSIDERATION OF OLD BUSINESS

1. Adopt amended Article V of the Personnel Policy Commissioner Heglar reviewed the changes he made to the draft amendments from the recommendations he received from council.

Town Clerk Avery said she was concerned that the policy specifically addresses "full-time" positions. She asked if council wanted the policy to pertain to only full-time positions or to part-time and temporary positions, too.

MPT Bloszinsky said council should just have one policy for all of the positions, and council agreed with him.

Town Clerk Avery said she will delete the word "full-time" in Sections A and C of the draft.

MOTION – Commissioner Heglar moved to adopt the amendments to Article V of the Personnel Policy, deleting the wording "full-time" in Sections A and C of the policy. SECOND – MPT Bloszinsky VOTE – Unanimous

NEW BUSINESS None

COMMISSIONER ITEMS

- 1. Room Occupancy Tax (ROT) Collection from Short-term Rental Properties MPT Bloszinsky referred council to a spreadsheet showing Kure Beach properties that are currently being rented on a short-term basis and made the following points:
 - The town needs to sustain the "in season" infrastructure and add more space for an aging Town Hall and Fire Department, and there is also a lack of committed financial resources for coastal storm damage resources from federal and state levels.
 - While investigating options to make town reserves grow, council found a number of short-term rental properties in Kure Beach that are not paying ROT.
 - Property owners who report and pay ROT deserve council support because they bring in tourists, businesses, jobs and entertainment, and they are responsible for a significant piece of the town's economy.
 - The town's gross ROT revenues for FY15-16 were \$880,290.
 - He, Mayor Swearingen and Town Clerk Avery will meet with county officials on Wednesday, August 24th at 10:00 a.m. to discuss how to handle the issue of unreported ROT for short-term rental properties.

Commissioner Heglar said council should work on a letter, which should include the ROT ordinance requirements, to be brought to the next council meeting. He said the letter should be mailed to all suspected, non-paying, short-term rental property owners, recommending that they read the ordinances, and stating that council will be encouraging the county tax office to contact them. He said, at the same time, the town should put something in the Island Gazette about this.

MPT Bloszinsky said it's logical to think that, if we can get all of the short-term rental property owners to pay the ROT, town revenues could actually double.

The mayor mentioned that some of the HOAs in Kure Beach have their own covenants that don't allow short-term rentals in their communities.

MPT Bloszinsky said there were some HOAs that declined to provide their list of short-term renters to him. He said he thinks that the HOAs may be willing to provide the information after the meeting with the county tax office.

Mayor Swearingen said she asked MPT Bloszinsky to write up a report on the steps that were taken to obtain their information. She said other beach communities along the NC coast may like to know our process so they can do something similar.

Commissioner Whitley said that the Planning and Zoning Commission started the conversation about this almost two years ago.

MPT Bloszinsky said he doesn't care how hard the work is in dealing with this issue as long as it gets good results.

I would like to request council consideration and the appropriate Department heads consideration of waiving any potential sewer tap fee for the following reasons:

- Home was sold as being on water and sewer
- Research shows that in 1983 and again in 1999 it was required to be hooked up to the towns system
- Bills state that there has been over \$3800.00 in sewer fees collected since 1999 (prior billing was not available)
- There may have been other fees paid at some point but I have not been able to confirm that through the records available, I think they may have already been collected but I as the new owner cannot confirm that. Your assistance here would be helpful.
- The price to take out the current tank and have it filled properly is \$7900.00 of which I the owner will have to take care of in other ways.
- It is a hardship for sellers too as it was an inherited property so therefore the sellers had no knowledge of the septic tank and drain field being there. They have paid years of bills prior to the sale of the property for they had no knowledge of it still being connected to a septic any more than I.
- We have confirmed that it is hooked to town water. Mr. Beeker and his staff
 with Public Works were kind enough to check and confirm. If hooked to water
 then why not sewer? Was there a fee paid at the time of that tap?
- We had two other independent plumbers come and give me quotes for the process, they also confirmed that it is not hooked to sewer at this time and indeed is hooked to a septic tank.

In doing the research for this if may have just been a misstep however the additional expense was not expected and with wanting to very much be in compliance I am looking for any and all input. I would like to know if there were any checks and balances as to what was required and if this has happened before in the town?

I want and look forward to working with the town and answering any questions. I want to very much be in compliance for we are adding on to the home and it was in the process of preparing for the expansion of our home when we discovered this is an issue. Please consider adding me for the towns next meeting and being added to the agenda to see what we can do to work together for a solution.

Sec. 17-127. - User fees.

- (a) The user's fee for water and sewer shall be on file in the town clerk's office.
- (b) The user's fees shall apply to all services whether inside or outside of corporate limits and shall be payable upon the issuance of a building permit.
- (c) All of the user's fees shall apply to individual, residential, duplex, motels, or multifamily units, excepting therefrom any property owner within the corporate limits who wishes to replace or upgrade his premises shall not be subject to those fees unless or until he replaces more units than he originally had on his property and the additional units placed thereon over and above the original units shall be charged per unit under the schedule hereinabove set out. Further, any owner who has torn down or removed his dwelling prior to March 1, 1982 shall not be exempted.
- (d) All user fees shall be accrued to the benefit of the sewer expansion reserve fund and all user fees collected by the water fund shall be appropriated to the sewer expansion reserve fund. (Ord. of 11-15-83, § 25-29.2; Ord. of 12-20-83, § 25-29.2)

Sec. 17-128. - Impact fees.

On all voluntary annexations there shall be charged an impact fee per unit on all single and multifamily residential units which is on file in the town clerk's office, which shall be payable upon the issuance of a building permit. Any voluntary annexation which occurs which as a single family unit or multifamily units located upon the land shall pay a fee per unit which is on file in the town clerk's office which shall be payable upon annexation.

Subject: Re: Swearing in alternate for Planning and Zoning

Town Council voted to add an alternate position to the P&Z Commission on March 23, 2015. On April 21st of the same year, Town Council adopted an ordinance to the Code to allow an alternate position on P&Z. Also on the the 21st, Council appointed Kenneth Richardson as an alternate on P&Z.

All town committees and the Board of Adjustment have alternate members. The purpose of an alternate is to allow town business to be conducted in the event there is not a quorum of regular members.

Definition of an alternate is "a person authorized to fill the position, exercise the duties etc., of another who is temporarily absent; substitute".

Section 2-41 of the Code regarding P&Z reads: " one alternate may be appointed by the Town Council who shall be seated as a regular member, automatically, in the event a member of the Commission resigns or becomes incapacitated and unable to serve".

On April 21st, 2016, Town Council appointed John Cawthorne as an alternate on P&Z.

P&Z requested this topic be on Council's September agenda as the Commission is not in favor of allowing an alternate to have voting rights.

Council members, if you choose to do away with an alternate on P&Z, you will need to let Mr. Cawthorne know his appointment is no longer valid. Since the Code reads 'may' appoint, I don't think it would need to be repealed, unless you decide to never have an alternate on P&Z. In that event, you should vote to repeal section 2-41 of Chapter 2, Article III, of the Code.

Mr. Richardson said he has lived in Kure Beach for five years, served on the Kure Keys HOA for three years and was their HOA President for one year. He said he worked for the Department of Energy where he was in charge of planning and production of many projects. He said the DOE was like a small city in itself where they had a fire, police and utility department. He said if they planned anything, they had to look at the whole process and all of the ins and outs. He said that the three local beach mayors don't think it's fair to continue to tax their citizens an extra 17.5 percent to pay for any shortfall that the County has. He said that the local beach mayors are very upset that the County didn't put any line item in their budget to address beach nourishment. He said that the interlocal agreement stated it was a "one-time deal" that would go away whenever the mayors gave the County enough notice, so the mayors are meeting tomorrow to discuss this. He asked Council's permission to vote against keeping the 17.5 percent in the Town's budget. He said he explained to the County Commission chairman that, if the Town has to pay the percentage, it will cost every man, woman and child in Kure Beach about \$500 each; but the chairman still didn't see any reason to drop the percent.

In the absence of a recommendation from the commission, the town council may, if it deems wise, after the expiration of thirty (30) days from the date on which the question has been submitted in writing to the planning and zoning commission for review and recommendation, take final action.

Sec. 2-54. - Street naming.

The planning and zoning commission may recommend to the town council names for streets not heretofore named, may approve or reject names proposed by owners of additions or developments, may recommend changes of names of streets where names are found to be duplicated and may recommend changing the designation of streets where misapplications are found to exist.

Sec. 2-55. - Submission of recommendations, etc.

All acts, findings, decisions and determinations of the planning and zoning commission shall be submitted in the form of recommendations to the town council and such recommendations, when approved by the town council, shall have the force and effect of ordinances.

ORDINANCE AMENDMENT

That Section 2-41 of the Code of the Town of Kure Beach, North Carolina, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-41. - Composition; terms of office.

- The Planning and Zoning Commission shall consist of five (5) regular members who (1) shall be citizens and residents of the town.
- One (1) alternate may be appointed by the Town Council who shall be seated as a regular (2) member, automatically, in the event a member of the Commission resigns or becomes incapacitated and unable to serve.

PROPOSED NEW ORDINANCE

Chapter 12 Parks and Recreation, Article 2. Recreation, Division 2. Beach, (new) Subdivision A. Beach Safety and Conservation Standards

Sec. 12-47. Policy.

It is the policy of the Town of Kure Beach to encourage and promote the recreational use of its beach while protecting human safety and conserving and sustaining the sensitive ecosystems of the beach including, but not being limited to, the stabilizing system of sand dunes, sea turtle nesting sites, the nests and young of local and migratory bird species, and the habitats of other maritime plant and wildlife communities. In achieving the purposes of this policy, all actions not otherwise provided for in the Code which occur on or are requested to occur on the beach, including the frontal dune, beach strand, and prohibited areas, shall be evaluated by pertinent Department Heads under and conform to the safety and conservation standards set forth below.

Sec. 12-48. Safety and Conservation Standards.

- (a) The following safety and conservation standards shall be used to evaluate the occurrence of actions on the beach not otherwise provided for in the Code. In conforming to these standards, all such actions shall not:
 - (1) Pose a direct or indirect threat to human safety.
 - (2) Impede, obstruct, disrupt, or hinder the provision of law enforcement, ocean rescue, and other emergency services.
 - (3) Unreasonably interfere with the public's use and enjoyment of the beach by emitting loud, disturbing, or unnecessary noise or by discharging fuel or other hazardous materials onto the beach surface or in ocean waters.
 - (4) Involve a vehicle being operated on the beach at night which, for purposes of this sub-section, shall be construed to mean the time from one (1) hour before sunset to one (1) hour after sunrise.
 - (5) Have the potential of damaging the system of sand dunes.
 - (6) Have the potential of damaging or destroying vegetation.
 - (7) Have the potential of damaging or destroying sensitive maritime ecosystems.
 - (8) Have the potential of increasing beach erosion.

- (9) Have the potential of resulting in the harassment, injury, and/or death of local or migratory bird species or their young.
- (10) Have the potential of resulting in the harassment, injury, and/or death of sea turtle eggs and/or hatchlings.
- (11) Have the potential of resulting in the harassment, injury, and/or death of adult female sea turtles attempting to nest on the beach.

In addition, any such actions shall comply with all applicable Federal, State, and local statutes, codes, regulations, rules, policies, and ordinances.

Sec. 12-49. Exceptions.

The provisions of this division do not apply to authorized personnel performing designated functions including, without limitation, the following: policing and maintaining the beach; ocean rescue and other emergency services; code enforcement; and beach nourishment projects. The Town may also close the beach or restrict activities thereon to eliminate or reduce an immediate threat to human or habitat safety during a state of emergency, natural disaster, or other unforeseen circumstances.
